It's been a relatively incident free month in Holt and surrounding Parishes despite Halloween & Bonfire night celebrations and the Christmas Lights switch on in town. There have been incidents of damage to the public toilets but thankfully these have reduced in recent months. Hopefully you will have seen more police officers patrolling the town as part of a push to get our response teams more engaged in neighbourhood policing. The darker winter nights are well and truly here and I would take this opportunity to remind everyone of the importance of using lights on vehicles and cycles for safety purposes. It also makes is easier for thieves to poke about particularly in rural areas so make sure that valuable items are secured where possible as removing the opportunity for crime is the best way of preventing it. We are still on the lookout for more Special Constables to join us and will be running a local recruitment event in January. If you have a New Years Resolution to do something different then consider helping out your local community as a volunteer officer.

# **Crime Updates (1st to 31st October 2019)**

Offence	Numbers	What could this entail
Arson	0	Damage caused as a result of fire.
Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)	2	Harassment, alarm or distress is caused in a non-crime incident.
Burglary - Residential	0	Entry and theft to any building within the curtilage/boundary of a residence.
Burglary - Business and Community	0	Entry and theft to any building or structure not within the curtilage/ boundary of a residence.
Criminal Damage	4	A person destroys or damages property belonging to someone else.
Domestic	5	Domestic incidents where a crime has not occurred. Parties are aged 16 or over and have been intimate partners or family members regardless of sexuality.
Hate Incident	0	Any incident where a crime has not occurred which the victim, or anyone else, thinks is based on someone's prejudice towards them because of their race, religion, sexual orientation, disability or because they are transgender.
Race or Religious aggravated public fear	0	Any crime determined to have a hate element as per above.
Possession of controlled substance	0	Unlawful possession of a drug classified in class A, B or C.
Possession of weapons	0	Unlawful possession of an article used as a weapon.
Public fear, alarm or distress	2	Public order offences e.g. from a verbal altercation to offences just short of violence.
Robbery	0	Includes a range of offences where force is used, threatened or the victim is put in fear.
Theft from a motor vehicle	0	Any item stolen that was in, on or attached to a motor vehicle.
Theft or unauthorised taking of a motor vehicle	0	Any motor vehicle including those abandoned.
Theft of pedal cycle	0	From a public place, if stolen from a shed or garage this would be a Burglary Residential.
Theft from a person	0	Purse being taken from a handbag, or a mobile phone from a shopping basket.

Every year burglary tends to increase during the autumn months as the afternoons get darker, making it easier to identify unoccupied homes which are often left unlit. You can help protect your home by following some basic crime prevention advice such as:

- Use timer switches on a lamp, radio or TV so they turn on as it gets dark in the afternoons.
- Make a habit of checking that ground floor windows and doors are closed and locked when you
  leave the house or go to bed. Upstairs windows should be closed and locked when the house is
  unoccupied.
- PVC doors should be locked by lifting the handle and turning the key to ensure all the security features are in place.
- Car and house keys should be kept out of sight in a safe place. Don't leave them on display on window sills, in porches, hallways or kitchens.
- Secure your rear garden by shutting and locking any gates. Burglars can use garden tools, like ladders to break in, please ensure you always lock away tools after use.
